Housekeeping Gem:


Each month we will have a character word of the month that is announced daily.

Here are the skills with the stories and texts that we are exploring in ESL classes.

Kindergarten students will learn about story characters by reading a fiction titled Tell All About It; and identify parts of a story by reading a realistic fiction titled My Pet Cat.


First Grade students will analyze the graphic features of the informational text The Places in Our Town; and describe setting and characters of the fantasy story A Cat Named Ben.

Second Grade students will describe characters and setting of a realistic fiction titled Foster's Famous Farm; and analyze graphic features in an informational text titled Bees at Work.

Third Grade students will compare and contrast ideas from historical fiction text titled Champ; and explain cause-and-effect relationship ideas in the biography text titled Hank Aaron.

Fourth Grade students will analyze the theme of the play titled Friends on a Field Trip; and describe and analyze character's thoughts, actions, and words to better understand the tall tale The Amazing Balina.

Fifth Grade students will analyze sequence of events of the narrative nonfiction text titled Patsy Mink and Title IX; and explain the theme of the realistic fiction Baseball Memories.

CLUE is excited to begin our first mini-studies! Primary CLUEsters are becoming petrologists in a study of rocks. We are learning about the different types of rocks and their many uses. We plan to explore how rocks and minerals are part our everyday lives.
